hat should be on our minds, as we sit down to Seder this year? We will no doubt be thinking about family, food, kibitzing, and those 4 cups of wine. We must remind ourselves, as we focus on the accoutrements of the meal, that our focus must be of a more profound nature. The story we retell is one of economic disparity-those kept in poverty to serve the needs of a wealthy and opulent Egyptian society. The story we retell is one of religious subjugation- where Jews are regarded as inferior because of their religious beliefs in one God. The story we tell is of the abuse of political power-a Pharaoh, and a clever vizier (our Joseph) who attain wealth for the State while forcing the Egyptian people into dire economic straits by collecting all the grain to sell back to the people through the years of famine. It is a story of triumph over political corruption, inhumanity to a subject people, and the rising up of courageous souls to change their lives.

We sell the power of the Exodus story short if we think we can spend 15 minutes eating matzo, salted parsley, and delicious haroset, and then move on.

What could be on our minds, as we sit down to Seder? Our tradition teaches 600,000 souls left Egypt 3,500 years ago, refugees who had only a few hours to pack their homes, grab gold and silver from Egyptian neighbors, and bake the



dough that was rising in the kitchen.

In 2016, more than 10 million people, including 50% of all Syrians, have fled their homes. If we let that statistic fall on a hard heart because many of these refugee are Muslims or because they might not like Jews or Israel, we make ourselves akin to Pharaoh, whose moral crime was that of a hardened heart. Not every Syrian is a would-be terrorist or an anti-Semite.

What do we say of those who ignored Jewish refugees prior to World War II because those potential refugees were a different religion, and... you know, you can't trust a Jew? Can we be guilty of the same racism?

What *might* be on our minds as we sit down to Seder? Perhaps the 1.3 million Eritreans, who have left their South Sudanese country and fled, (about 60,000 are now living in Israel, seeking asylum). Or the million who have flooded Europe in the last year. When we look at the causes of a *continued on page 2*

Would you like to see fewer homeless people on our streets? A year ago Rabbi Lisa and other clergy wrote the Ventura City Council requesting a meeting and workshop to help resolve this issue together.

The City Council finally realized we are very serious and agreed to meet Monday, April 18 at 6 pm in the Island View Room in the Derby Club, at the Ventura Fairgrounds. This is our opportunity to make our voices heard. We NEEDYOUR PRESENCE at this meeting. Come with your family and all your friends and neighbors. Numbers really count.

The Ventura Chamber of Commerce is providing major support for this event, recognizing the problem and joining with the faith community and the downtown business owners to resolve the homeless situation. Some of the ways we want to do this are: • Change current zoning so a 24-hour permanent shelter with supportive services can become a reality leading to permanent housing and the homeless off the streets.

• Have the City of Ventura set aside specific properties for very low income housing to be built, to expedite construction by reducing permit fees, streamlining the process, and inviting low income housing developers to build.

• Work with developers/contractors to rehab some existing properties to very affordable housing.

Refugee Relief in Israel by Barbara Horne-Petersdorf

Barbara Horne-Petersdorf, the daughter of Rikki Horne and Rudy Petersdorf (z'l) grew up at Temple Beth Torah and graduated UCLA in spring 2015. She participated in birthright, and is spending a gap year in Israel, through the Masa program, which places American Jewish college age students in internships in Israel. We asked Barbara to share with our congregation the work she is doing with African refugees.

When I decided to move to Israel last May, I had no specific goals or hopes for my experience. I only knew that I wanted a year of adventure, travel and a new environment before I continue my studies in law school. After seven months of living in Tel Aviv, my expectations for this 'gap year' have been exceeded more times over than I can count.

Living in Israel during these times of tension is interesting. 'The situation', which is how all Israelis refer to the continued violence between Israelis and Palestinians, has persisted throughout the entirety of my time here. Shootings and stabbings by Palestinians occur weekly throughout Israel. However, whenever people ask me if I feel safe here, my answer is always a resounding "yes". The atmosphere of fear here is uniquely absent, especially in Tel Aviv, a city that has no time to pause or hesitate at words of a terror attack. While I originally came to Israel to experience a new culture, I have also learned so much from the diverse communities of people living here. Everyone here has a story and is eager to let it be known. This is everyone from the Orthodox community to the secular Israelis, the Palestinians, the Christians, the Russians, the French and the African refugees. This leads me in to what exactly I am doing with my time here in Tel Aviv.

In January I began interning at the African Refugee Development Center (ARDC) in the heart of South Tel Aviv. Israel is currently experiencing the aftershocks of the past ten years, where over 60,000 African refugees, mostly from Eritrea and Sudan, fled into Israel. The Israeli Government was unequipped and unprepared to deal with such a humanitarian crisis, and this shows everyday through the injustices and maltreatment these asylum seekers have to live with. These asylum seekers are dropped off at the now infamous Levinsky Park, where they are given no direction, resources or assistance in rebuilding their lives. Now, within a several block radius there exists a renegade slum, drawing criticism from Tel Avivians. My office is tucked inside of this dilapidated community, and we open our doors to asylum seekers, providing services to help them apply for refugee status, reunify with family members in a



third country and pursue higher education opportunities.

I dove head first into my work with the ARDC and each day I am learning so much and gaining new insights into another complex issue within Israel, one that does not receive nearly as much attention as it should. A Somali man named Ashraf, a friend whom I help with English, opened my eyes in a way I could never have expected. The first day we met, I was complaining about the traffic in Tel Aviv. He looked at me head tilted and asked, "You have been trafficked too?" After a second of confusion, I realized that Ashraf only knew one definition of 'traffic' *continued on page 7*

We eat all of the traditional foods and enjoy our Passover customs.

y parents have always been the Passover Seder hosts among our family and close friends. Every year we see new faces; my parents always seem to find people who have no other place to go, "what is one more person?" Everyone takes turns reading from our out of date and much loved Haggadot. We eat all of the traditional foods and enjoy our Passover customs. Over 35 years ago, my parents each wrote a beautiful and personal essay about what Passover meant to each them. Each year, before we do anything else, they take out their essays in their original handwriting and read them aloud. They speak about Passovers long ago. They speak of Passover dishes that have survived earthquakes; the long-standing tradition of the kids being told to "shah" (be quiet), and my Grandma's fresh gefilte fish made with whitefish and pike, the whiter the fish the better.

Though not traditional, we recall the names of the people who are no longer with us. My mother lights Yahrzeit candles for each of them. These words and customs have become part of our Seder, our order. I hope you will share with me your Passover traditions.

I can't wait to see what we are able to grow



in our Temple Garden this spring! I was fortunate enough to spend a morning at the Hansen Agricultural Research and Extension Center for a workshop on growing vegetables. Now that I know what to plant and how to plant it, I need some help doing it. Let me know when you can spend some time helping in our Garden.

I had the greatest time getting to know the women of the Achava Rosh Hodesh group. We had an amazing discussion about the different masks that we all "wear" during different stages of our life. Each woman then decorated her own mask. The masks are on display across from the Torah school office.

I feel so honored to be learning from such resilient and optimistic people, and in turn devoting my time to help make their lives easier.

If you are wondering if there is a solution in the making regarding Israel's refugee crisis, the unfortunate answer is that there is not. Until the Israeli Government creates a legal framework to address the enormous community of Africans living in our stand more about Tikkun Olam. We have many hands on activities and special projects planned for them so they learn the importance of how recycling and repurposing help to care for the earth.

The Senior Readers of Ventura County will be performing for the children this month on April 27. These performers are retired people who go to schools where they act out stories that children love. Some of the delightful members of the troupe are also members of TBT.

country, we will remain in a limbo—a delicate balance where these asylum seekers are not being deported, but are also not given any permission to work, social services, rights or representation.

I see the values of Judaism in place everyday within my work, although I am not working within a specific Jewish context. Each day I am reminded of humility, compassion, patience, respect and inclusion, all of which are crucial values my Jewish upbringing introduced me to at an early age. I may be a secular Jew, helping a huge group of non-Jews, who have created a lot of controversy within Tel Aviv, but I feel confident that the work I am doing is important and just. I am proud to say that in working at the ARDC, albeit without the apparent Jewish context, I still gain inspiration in knowing that many of the Jewish values I have grown up with are present here everyday.



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
