

Rabbi's Message

Rabbi Lisa Hochberg-Miller



he Talmudic rabbis understood the number 70 to represent completeness. At 70, in their estimation, a person had reached the fullness of years. Perhaps because it was based on the number 7, which designates wholeness (think the seven days of creation), the rabbis imagined that 70 was the culmination of life, the moment of self-realization. From 70, the hair turned grey,



the body bent, and old age set in. Such was their experience, 15 centuries ago!

But 70 also was a celebra-

tion of all that comes with "the fullness of life." It was a time to revel in wisdom, in maturity, in family, in retirement from one's life work, and the chance to study, give and rest—all important components of living a good life. As is true in our own day, 70 was an achievement, not an ending.

These are the thoughts that surround me as we reach Israel's 70th anniversary of statehood this spring. April 18 is Yom HaAtzmaut, Israel Independence Day. Could it really be 70 years since the iconic photo of David ben Gurion was snapped, his standing at the microphone on the dias in Independence Hall in Tel Aviv, declaring

statehood would occur at midnight on May 14/15, 1948? For many of us, we remember that moment; for others of us, Israel has always been there. For some of us, we recall too well the wars of those first decades, when we held our breath praying that Israel would survive. For some of us, we continue to hold our breath. For others, we no longer worry about existential survival, but are concerned with issues of safety, security and other aspects of existence. Young or old, as American Jews Israel holds a place in our lives. There is a connection to Israel that is unlike any other country on earth that we do not physically inhabit!

So what can we offer Israel, in honor of 70 years? We can offer Israel the kind of unconditional love we offer our family members. The desire to know her better, the patience to understand her issues and concerns. The desire to address the difficult political and religious issues she wrestles with—just as we do with that same unconditional love we have for the United States. When we consider all the states that were created and failed during the 20th century, Israel's success as a democratic state at 70 years must give us pause to reflect and consider the attributes of her success. And what contribution has the Jewish nature of this state played in her remarkable achievements of science, humanities, medicine, law, liberal faith, government, education, environmentalism, and the like?

As Israel reaches this age which our sages considered full and blessed, may Israel merit a future that continues to be so!

President's Message

Rabbi Jaclyn's resignation came as a shock to all of us.

le had a wonderful Purim Carnival this year! Over 110 children attended. I know the count because Deborah and I sold the tickets at the door. As you can see in my photo, my go-to costume is Medusa because once you own an amazing hat like that, why would you be anything else? It is especially fun to have kids pretend to turn to stone once they recognize who I am. Thanks to Marisa, Danielle, and all the volunteers who made Candyland such a fun day!

I am sorry to be writing this at the end of a difficult week. Rabbi Jaclyn's resignation came as a shock to all of us. We had no idea she was looking for another job. I have been getting some questions from fellow congregants and I thought I should provide those answers to all of you.

We offer a competitive salary with benefits to our candidates because we consult with the placement directors at the schools in Los Angeles and New York. We signed a two-year contract. We did not pay moving expenses for Rabbi Jaclyn because this was a part-time job of 28 hours. Her husband, an accountant, had accepted a full-time job in Woodland Hills. We had hoped they would settle in Ventura, but Camarillo or Thousand Oaks would have worked as well, both for him and for her. They have been living with her parents in Los Angeles since their move and although the commute can be challenging, we had several congregants offer their homes for Jaclyn and her family to stay in over the weekends.

The Board chose to terminate her contract early for several reasons, but primarily we were concerned about our b'nei mitzvah students. We have three this year and all three ceremonies take place this summer. Rabbi Jaclyn's final weekend with us was going to be the weekend before the first bat mitzvah. The Board felt that it would be better for our students to adjust to a new tutor now instead of dealing with that change just before they stepped up on the bimah.

Rabbi Jaclyn came from a large synagogue in Seattle and was accustomed to a very formal administration; we are more casual here in Ventura. She commented on this to me and I offered to meet with her weekly to answer questions or to guide her in any way I could. I also offered to include her in my weekly meetings with Rabbi Lisa. She didn't think this was necessary and when she

wanted to talk, we met. I was always available and so was Rabbi Lisa. Rabbi Jaclyn told me that Lisa was a wonderful colleague and mentor.

Our situation is not uncommon in small synagogues across the country. Rabbi Lisa has a colleague whose temple uses only musicians and doesn't have a cantor. I have been getting suggestions from many of you and I am sharing them with the Board. Our beloved Robin Faigin has stepped up to lead us in our Shabbat services and we have hired a tutor for our b'nei mitzvah students who lives in North Hollywood, but Skypes with the kids. They are so comfortable with the computer that this is easy for them.

The Board re-approved our ad from last year and I immediately sent it to the placement director at the cantorial school in Los Angeles. Rabbi Lisa has heard of some candidates through word of mouth and she is attending a conference this week (March 18–21) and will talk to other colleagues. We will find solutions to keep music in our services and Torah school, tutoring for our students, and a soaring spiritual experience for the High Holy Days.

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
