# New Times and Programs for Shabbat in 5779!




There is plenty that is new as we begin our year of Shabbat services!

Our First Friday TBT, (FF-TBT), has become Family First Friday (FFF-TBT), as we move our monthly Torah School Shabbat service to the first week, on the same night as our popular Tot Shabbat. The two services are bridged by a Shabbat dinner, coordinated through our Torah School. Reservations will be needed, so look for information from our Torah school partners. Services and dinner are open to everyone, not just school families! Student rabbi Noah Diamondstein joins us on the FFF, and families will be praying from Mishkan T'filah forYouth, the colorful, engaging prayer book that our Wednesday Torah School students use. If you'd like to help with the dinners, be in touch with Danielle in the Torah school office.

Rabbi Noah, who you hopefully met over the HHDs, will be with us two weekends each month. He will be doing a combination of these things each week: leading Shabbat services, preaching, chanting torah on Shabbat morning, giving d'vrei torah, and leading torah study. In addition, he is teaching a monthly adult ed on Sundays, and bringing music and t'filah to Sunday's Torah school students. His weekends will be posted in the

Shofar, and in the T'kiah.



Your monthly Shofar and weekly T'kiah will let you know about our other Shabbat services in the month including guest speakers, Shabbat dinners, and holiday celebrations.





# **Expand Your Horizons-Learn Something New!**

le have some great learning opportunities coming up in the next couple of months! Take a class with a friend and grow together or come on your own and meet new friends who share your interests. You're sometimes too young, but never too old to expand your mind.

### A Taste of Judaism and Jewish Literacy Rabbi Mike Lotker

The three-part Taste of Judaism class, designed to introduce the main tenets of Judaism, will be followed by a 15-week Jewish Literacy class. These classes are ideal for Jews, for their spouses, for those who are exploring conversion, and those who simply wish to broaden their knowledge about the fundamentals of Judaism's extraordinary history, beliefs and faith. The 15 classes of Jewish Literacy touch on most of the areas of concern and interest to adults who wish to explore the holidays, sacred literature, history, spirituality, mysticism, and living a full Jewish life. *This class is required for conversion candidates*. Copies of the syllabus are available at TBT.

Tuition: There is no cost for "A Taste of Judaism" for anyone or for "Jewish Literacy" for members of area synagogues. The suggested donation for "Jewish Literacy" for non-members is \$150 plus the cost of any texts and materials. Couples pay only one registration fee. The suggested donation for non-members deciding to "drop in" on classes is \$10 per session. If these fees are a barrier to anyone's participation, please speak with Rabbi Lotker; nobody will be turned away.

Every family that has a connection to Judaism, whether all, most, or some of the family members are Jews, has a set of values that guide family life. Sometimes those values are spoken and specific, sometimes they are implicit and very general, but values shape family life. Jewish values, as we will learn in Rabbi Hochberg-Miller's course on *Middot*, are an amazing resource for imbuing a life with Judaism, and Judaism has an entire series of rituals and practices (some daily and some just once or twice a year) that can take those immaterial values and make them tangible!

Over the course of seven sessions, we'll discuss major categories of Jewish ritual and practice, learn where they come from and how to perform them, and make Jewish actions feel doable, customizable, and ready to plug-and-play at home. You get out what you put in! If we take Jewish practice and action seriously, and ensure that they are grounded in *middot*, they will meaningfully enrich our lives every single day.

**Kavod** – **Respect.** Judaism teaches us to treat other and ourselves with respect. Kavod is a feeling of regard for the rights, dignity, feelings, wishes and abilities of others. Teasing and name-calling disrespect and hurt everyone; we need to respect people's differences.

Shalom Bayit – Peace in the Home. Temple Beth Torah is often considered a second home. Everyone needs to feel comfortable, safe, welcome and respected. Don't ostracize those who seem different. Strive to settle disagreements in peaceful and respectful ways that allow the community members to maintain their dignity.

**B'tzelem Elohim** – In God's Image. The Torah tells us that we are created in the image of God. This is a simple and profound idea that should guide our interactions with all people. If we see each person as created in the image of God, we can see humanity and dignity in all people.

Kol Yisrael Arevim Zeh Bazeh – Communal Responsibility. The Jewish principle that, "All of Israel is responsible for one another" means each of us must take action and inspire others to cre-

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
