Rabbi's Message

Rabbi Lisa Hochberg-Miller



am grateful that it is Hanukkah. The act of lighting candles, of increasing the light in the menorah from night to night, is the surest, most palpable ritual that reminds me that our world is a place of both dark and light, and that our work every moment of every day is to bring more light.

The month of November was filled with far too much darkness.

The killing of people in prayer, the killing of young people dancing and socializing, the destruction of homes and lives and communities through fire, brought so much darkness into this past month. We all felt it, for we are understanding more deeply than in a long time, that what affects

one of us directly, affects all of us indirectly. The murder of eleven Jews in prayer diminishes non-Jews. The death of young adults at a bar, diminishes all adults, even if we don't drink or dance. The terror of wildfire devastates people who have never seen such destruction, just as hurricanes in the east affects those of us who live out of hurricane zones.

We have seen the darkness of hate. We have seen the evil of gun violence. But we also saw community, love and faith dispel darkness. We saw non-Jews flood to our temple to surround us with support and their shared sense of horror at the murder at Tree of Life synagogue. A non-Jewish woman named Ruth came to Shabbat morning services because she heard on NPR that people should go to synagogue to support the Jewish community, in the aftermath of the Pittsburgh shooting. She spent the entire morning with us because she wanted us to know that others care, and that respect and responsibility for each other still exists in this country. We heard ministers at multiple interfaith services lift up the language of comfort, of love, of partnership. They dispel the darkness.

Neshmat adam ner Adonai – the human soul is the light of God. When our souls are touched by the violence, and the loss and the destruction of recent weeks, we are reminded that it is up to us to perpetuate God's presence in the world. It is that simple. We can let our fears of anti-Semitism diminish our flames. We can let our anger at haters diminish our spirit. We can let people who hold different ideologies, opinions and beliefs continued on page 2

calcify us into tribes who insulate ourselves from others. Or we can use the human life implanted within each of us — our light — to fight the darkness of ignorance and hate. It means facing the dark, not running from it. Speaking up and out.

In these weeks, I have seen more bridges built, more hands being held and more alliances being forged. I have had significant conversations with evangelical ministers and black pastors. I have stepped into more non-lewish houses of worship than usual. I have been met with willing partners every step of the way - because we are only one of many communities who care about the intolerance, the angry rhetoric, the fomented fears that are destroying the decency of our community. We must face hate with love, we must face fear with partnership, and we must know that this is the work of being a Jew in the world, and in America right now. Our ancestors have lit hanukkiyot at this season for two thousand years, standing up to tyranny, to intolerance, to repression of Jewish life. And they have prevailed. All we need is the will and the courage to be reminded that the values and ideals we hold as American Jews are all worth speaking up for. May our resolve grow stronger each night of Hanukkah, and may our desire to bring more light into the world continue on through all seasons.

President's Message

No issue weighs more heavily on me than that of your security.

am writing this in November with a sorrowful heart. The weeks since my last column have been filled with terrible events which profoundly affect our Jewish community. I was in Canada at the time of the Tree of Life synagogue shooting. Five minutes after I read the story, I had a call from Jackie Stone to tell me that the Ventura Police Department had started hourly checks on our temple. Congregant Ron Turner arrived at TBT at 9:00 a.m. and sat in the lobby watching the front door until 9:00 that night. We are a busy place, but that weekend was packed with activities. We had Shabbat services in the morning, a book group discussion in the afternoon, a special havdalah service in the early evening, and a Dodger fundraiser for the Torah School that night. The Fran Elson Film Festival event took place on Sunday and thankfully, as has become our custom, the Film Committee had reserved security for the afternoon.

On Friday, November 2, Temple Beth Torah hosted a remarkable interfaith service with 20 clergy members participating in a show of unity, love, and faith. We estimate that the crowd was close to 700 people with every chair we had in use, the sanctuary and choir loft packed, and people standing both upstairs and down. Rabbi Lisa has spent years cultivating these interfaith relationships and it was very moving to see so many different religious leaders and people of faith come together in a stand against hate and violence. The violation of a Jewish sanctuary is a violation of all religious sanctuaries. We livestreamed the event and also posted it to our Facebook page if you would like to see it.

As your president, there is no issue that weighs more heavily upon me than that of your security. We have had sterling leadership from past Boards and committees; people who recognized very early the need to keep Temple Beth Torah safe and secure. In 1999 they had video cameras and locking mechanisms installed. We tread on a path laid out by past leaders and your Board and committees continue work that was started years ago. We constantly upgrade our security with the advice and help of our local police and FBI. After the shooting at the bar in Thousand Oaks, we reexamined everything. VPD recommends active shooter drills and we will be

scheduling two and possibly three. I will send a letter to all of you when the drills are scheduled and I ask that everyone attend. Your involvement is key to our success.

The TBT staff has been on high alert during these difficult weeks. One morning Martha was called away from her desk to help the *Shofar* volunteers in the library and Danielle was in charge of buzzing people in. A police officer appeared at the front door and asked to be let in. Danielle checked the parking lot and asked, "Where is your squad car?"

The officer explained that he was a Commander and they drive unmarked cars. In the middle of this explanation, Martha came into the lobby, saw the officer, opened the door, and asked if she could help him. He started explaining that he was a real police officer, he just didn't drive a squad car. Martha let him in, but was somewhat embarrassed by Danielle's diligence. I came into the office later, heard the story, and was very pleased! "That could have been a test by the police department," I said, "or it could have been a stripper!"






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Brotherhood

Every family that has a connection to Judaism, whether all, most, or some of the family members are Jews, has a set of values that guide family life. Sometimes those values are spoken and specific, sometimes they are implicit and very general, but values shape family life. Jewish values, as we will learn in Rabbi Hochberg-Miller's course on *Middot*, are an amazing resource for imbuing a life with Judaism, and Judaism has an entire series of rituals and practices (some daily and some just once or twice a year) that can take those immaterial values and make them tangible!

In these sessions, we'll discuss major categories of Jewish ritual and practice, learn where they come from and how to perform them, and make Jewish actions feel doable, customizable, and ready to plug-and-play at home. You get out what you put in! If we take Jewish practice and action seriously, and ensure that they are grounded in *middot*, they will meaningfully enrich our lives every single day.



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
