# Support our teens by letting them know that the work of caring for others is noble work.

he November wildfire that tore through Malibu and the Santa Monica Mountains devasted three lewish camps-- Gindling Hilltop, Hess-Kramer, and Camp JCA Shalom-which have been beloved summer homes to generations of Jewish kids from Southern California, including TBT kids. Just two years ago we held a TBT Family Shabbaton at Camp JCA Shalom. It's a rustic and fun-filled site that has hosted summer camp and year-round programming for the lewish Community Center of Los Angeles since 1971. For 80 Temple adults and kids, it was a memorable weekend of tie-dying, Shabbat songs, hiking in the hills, family games, a hilarious talent show, and plenty of singing with Robbo, the camp's longtime song leader. On November 10, the day after the Woolsey Fire, all that survived of Camp JCA Shalom was decades of memories. Gone were the cabins, dining hall, all-purpose center, nature center, art sheds, trails, fields, campfire pits, stages, admin building, and gathering places.

There are two things that ring true for us as Jews. First, the incredibly positive impact Jewish camping has on the Jewish soul and Jewish identity. Second, how hard-wired resilience is in the Jewish DNA. We know how to build from ashes. We know how to replace that which becomes impermanent. We know how to look to the future and dream dreams. We know how to give tzedakah to transform what is into what can be.

For the first time, our B'nai Mitzvah students have asked to create one joint Mitzvah Project for their B'nai Mitzvah, in order to respond to the

magnitude of the devastation of a camp that is a special place for a number of these students. Working with our VP of Community, Laney Samuels, these students and families are creating a "S'more Camp Havdalah & Fundraiser," on Saturday night, April 27, 6:00 – 8:15 p.m. Jewish summer camp is always about Saturday night Havdalah outdoors, so we invite you to come eat s'mores, sing, and be part of a night of games, activities, and fundraising. Come participate in the raffle and silent auction. Have a child or grandchild who likes summer camp? Camp JCA has even donated a week of summer camp as a Big prize!

Our goal is to raise money that can be donated from Temple Beth Torah to give tangible and community support to JCA Shalom, the Jewish Community Center Association, and the enterprise of Jewish summer camping. Having experienced the trauma of the Thomas Fire in December 2017, we know first-hand both the impact of loss and displacement, and the expansive nightmare of rebuilding, insurance claims, preparing scorched land for habitability, toxicity reports, ground stability, earthquake standards, etc. Imagine tackling that for hilly acreage and multiple buildings! But the promise of Jewish children laughing, singing, and running around carefree in the hills again inspires us. We can do our part to re-build this camp.

So this Passover, I am inviting you to help our community support a need that is greater than our own. Support our teens by letting them know

I now find that when the week gets hectic, I can recapture that feeling of calm that I experience every Saturday morning.

hile recently on vacation, I took a meditation class. The teacher asked everyone if they practiced any form of meditation in their life. Many people said that they had tried and it didn't work for them; they just couldn't empty their minds and focus quietly, it was too hard, but they thought they should be doing it. When it came my turn, I told the group that two and a half years ago I had started attending religious services every Saturday morning. I explained that in the beginning, my mind would race, thinking of all the things I needed to get done, but, over time, I learned to appreciate the quiet and the soothing aspect of familiar rituals. I now find that when the week gets hectic, I can recapture that feeling of calm that I experience every Saturday morning. The instructor was very interested and told the class that this was the first time someone had answered him in this way. He also said that I was describing mindfulness rather than meditation.


As the lesson proceeded, it became apparent that the room was filled with A type personalities, with the exception of me. I think I must be a B, C, or even a D type. When told to sit quietly and focus on the tips of my index finger and thumb touching, I was promptly in that quiet place that has become so familiar to me on Saturday mornings. No one else was quite able to do this. The next day, I was approached by two women who were very interested in what I had said in the class. We talked for some time and I learned that neither of them attended services except for weddings and funerals. This made me think about the value of my weekly attendance. Secular life has few rituals or time to seek out the small, still voice. Ritual provides a spiritual language for the experiences and passages of life for which there are no words. The great joys and sorrows of life are celebrated and eased, and living itself becomes a practice of gratitude and thought.

Services are a dear and familiar routine and have become an important part of my week. Saturday mornings find me at TBT reflecting, feeling grateful, and enjoying the company of my fellow congregants. I am especially happy to be with my

Please do contact me at robin@templebethtorah.com to let me know you're planning to attend, so I can have enough copies of music (and sufficient snacks, of course!)






# Community Yom HaShoah Commemoration

Our Jewish community comes together each year to celebrate at Simchat Torah, study on erev Shavuot, and to commemorate on Yom HaShoah. Please join us on Sunday, April 28 at 3 p.m. for a special program, hosted by Congregation Ner Ami, as Julie Kohner talks about the story that her parents first revealed on "This is Your Life." Hanna and Walter Kohner had one of the few Holocaust stories with a happy ending. The two were childhood sweethearts in Czechoslovakia before the war, with big plans for the future. When Hitler's armies closed in, Walter managed to get to the States, where his brothers were living. Hanna was arrested and miraculously survived internment in four concentration camps, including Auschwitz.

After the war, Walter learned from an American sergeant who helped liberate her that Hanna was still alive. He eventually found her in Amsterdam, and they were soon married. Settling in Los Angeles in 1946, Walter



became a theatrical agent, and with Hanna wrote their amazing story, Hanna and Walter, A Love Story, published in 2008. Please join us for a commemoration service, our guest speaker, and a light reception afterwards.


#### **Shabbot Book Discussion**

Leather stamping, archery, fairy dust potions and ribbon twirlers were some of the favorites. I had so much fun watching the kids build their own creations and search for the Golden Gnome! The Megillah reading was a great twist on the traditional story, and hearing the kids boo and cheer throughout was so much fun. I am thrilled to share with you that we met our \$2500.00 goal and exceeded it! Thank you so much to everyone that helped us reach this objective. This wonderful Torah School Fundraiser would not have been possible without the Purim Committee. Taylor Paskin, Keren Zaks and Inessa Gelman worked endlessly to make this event the great success it was. One of the commandments related to Purim is about giving mishloach manot. Mishloach manot literally means, "sending of portions." It is meant to ensure that everyone has enough food for the Purim feast held later in the day and to increase love and friendship among Jews and their neighbors. Our 3rd-6th Graders fulfilled this commandment by creating 25 boxes to send to our elderly community during the time of Purim. The boxes included; a decorated box, a handwritten note, a handpicked orange, home baked hamantashen and some other treats. This activity gives the students a chance to practice gimilut hasadim (acts of loving kindness).

Thank you so much to the talented and brave baker, DeAnna Scott. She successfully made hamantashen, with 40 Torah School Students! Robbie and Phoebe's mom is always happy to help out to ensure our activities have sweetness baked in. We appreciate your hard work and time.

Our bright and committed group of B'nei Mitzvah Students have come together to work on a joint mitzvah project. They have organized a Havdalah Fundraiser, benefitting JCA Shalom (A Jewish Camp in Malibu that was destroyed during

the fires). Please join them on April 27th, 2019, from 6:00–8:15 p.m. The cost is: \$20 per family/\$10 per individual. Price includes: Havdalah Service, supplies to create a Havdalah Spice Bag, Silent Auction (which includes a scholarship to a weekend camp from JCA Shalom), raffle, sing along, games for kids, Camp Fire, a s'more and a hot chocolate, and closing circle. 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
