Rabbi Lisa Hochberg-Miller



I was reminded that we are not powerless in the face of evil, anti-Semitism, hatred and ultra-nationalism, but we must be brave, smart and committed.

Amy Spitalnick and Roberta Kaplan are two young, passionate Jewish lawyers, and they may be amongst the bravest people I have ever met. These are the lawyers who are suing two dozen neo-Nazis for their role in inciting violence at the white nationalist rally in Charlottesville in August 2017. I heard Amy and Roberta speak recently at a rabbinic conference I attended in Cincinnati. I was reminded that we are not powerless in the face of evil, anti-Semitism, hatred and ultra-nationalism, but we must be brave, smart and committed. And that is a message I wanted to share with you.

Robbie, a civil rights lawyer, and Amy, executive director of Integrity First for America, are determined to ensure that the white supremacist who drove his car into a crowd and plowed down Heather Heyer is not the only one prosecuted for the extreme hatred and racism on display that awful weekend in Charlottesville, when neo-Nazis marched through the town square with torches, intimidating townsfolk while yelling anti-Semitic chants. Using the KKK Act of 1871 which says it is unlawful to engage in conspiracy based on racial animus, (passed by a Reconstructionist-era Congress to protect African-Americans in the wake of the Civil War,) Robbie Kaplan is using the internet postings of multiple hate groups on the dark web to expose a conspiracy to commit violence. Her suit targets Richard Spencer and Andrew Anglin, two white supremacist leaders, with the intent to financially ruin their organizations,

and to convict them for their incitement of violence. Roberta and Amy have found ten plaintiffs, including students, ministers and residents who were threatened by those at the rally. None of the plaintiffs are Jewish. But all are extraordinarily brave, to stand up against people whose hallmark is inciting others to social media defamation, physical violence and verbal accost. Each of these plaintiffs will have to forego participating in an existing legal suit against the University of Virginia for damages, a suit that will likely result in real financial damages being awarded, whereas the Integrity First suit will probably reap no financial reward, but will target the true offenders.

This is an important case to watch. The reality is that hatred is still alive and well in Charlottesville- as it is in most communities, including our own. Charlottesville schools continue to receive threats. The extremist right uses the internet to continue to recruit disaffected young white men, and to feed racial hatred and violence. After watching the video of a compatriot in New Zealand gun down Muslims in prayer in two mosques, Andrew Anglin commented that this brought him more joy than he'd had since he was a kid. There is no redemption for people filled with such sick hate- we can only seek to deny them the freedoms that society accords to responsible, socially appropriate adults.

The other reality is that funding this suit is a big challenge. Imagine the expense of a case

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against two dozen defendants who represent organizations that seek to move their followers to violent action. That cost includes the need for secure vans, protective vests, security going to and from court, and round the clock security for the plaintiffs and their families. Collecting forensic evidence from the cell phones of the 24 defendants is \$500 per phone. The defendants have hired a lawyer who is a Holocaust denier, and their expenses are being financed by bit-coins. Can we help them? Yes; visit their website at Integrity First for America to read more or donate at P.O. Box 1831, New York, NY 10016. We can also help by letting Amy and Robbie inspire us, that perverse hatred will not prevail if we do not let ourselves be afraid, and if we counter hate by building deeper relationships of community.

So, let me share with you the deeper connections of community I am seeing, in this past year, in the wake of Pittsburgh and New Zealand. TBT hosted an active-shooter training for Ventura churches recently, with a specialist from the Ventura Police Department. Ten churches sent clergy or lay leaders to this program, which Pam Small hosted on our behalf. In the wake of the New Zealand shooting, I wrote letters from our interfaith community to local mosques that were signed by well over a dozen clergy of all faiths. The level of social action connection between members of the interfaith community is spreading, beyond our decades-old cooperation on issues of

homelessness. The Latter-Day Saints invited us to help compile care packages for menstruant age girls in Africa. The Church of Religious Science brought to us important information about the 2020 census and how we can help get non-computer-savvy residents signed up. The members of the River Community Church texted us at a delicate moment to ask us to keep a critically ill infant in our prayers. The letters of support from area churches were all responded to with our thanks. I recently gave a dozen local clergy copies of *Semitism*, Jonathan Weisman's book about the rise of anti-Semitism and what is leading to this growth in racism. These are small but I believe important steps, in stating that people of good faith can tolerate, accept, and appreciate our differences and that we strive for an open, compassionate society, where people respond to each other from kindness, not from fear.

Take a look at the people you interact with. How can you strive to bring more kindness into the world, and diminish the fear? This is the work of tikkun olam ahead for all of us- and as Ronnie and Amy reminded me so powerfully when they spoke about their case against the Nazis, we are all plaintiffs in the case against violence, intolerance and racism.

I am very excited to be directing Camp Haverim for the sixth year in a row. Last summer was wonderful, and now I am looking forward to creating more memorable experiences this year.

Our camp will offer traditional camp activities, such as arts and crafts, games, sports and water play. We will also offer Jewish cultural and religious activities, Shabbat services on Fridays, and teaching Hebrew blessings.

Camp Haverim will be offered for 6 weeks starting June 17th thru July 26th. Each week will have a different theme, such as Spanish, Art, Gymnastics, Soccer, Drumming, and Lego Creations.

Camp is for children ages 3–9 years old, and we also offer a Parent & Me class for children 20 months–30 months on Tuesdays & Thursdays. Camp will offer a variety of activities that will be appropriate for each child's developmental level.

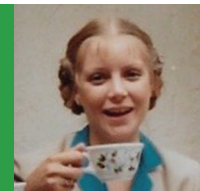

President's Message

I do my best to attend the services of our congregants; I know so many of you and also it is often meaningful to family and friends to have the president of the synagogue paying respects.

A friend of mine is in her eighties and every now and then she will have a series of funerals to attend, as if death comes and seizes her relatives, friends, and acquaintances in groups. I seem to have reached that time in my life because I have been attending many more funerals than usual for the last few weeks. I do my best to attend the services of our congregants; I know so many of you and also it is often meaningful to family and friends to have the president of the synagogue paying respects. I am representing all of you at such times and I attend both as myself, but also as a symbol, which can be a very odd feeling.

Judy Simon died in March and as a Holocaust survivor, her funeral was especially significant. Her daughter was grateful that Judy was able to die peacefully and without fear at a very great age. She survived Auschwitz, yet was able to live a normal life,

to marry, to have children and grandchildren, to be loved and appreciated. Her nephew told a haunting story about his father, Judy's brother. He came to America before the war and sponsored his sister and her new husband after the war. Sadly, he was unable to spend time with Judy because she looked so much like their mother. Their parents perished in Auschwitz and he had terrible survivor's guilt. This family story is wrenching; tragedy can ripple through generations in ways we can't imagine.

I attended two different services of people who were married for decades. The spouses left behind were bewildered and beyond grieving, but surrounded and supported by family and longtime friends. Sam and I were in Michigan recently to attend the viewing and burial of a dear friend. He was not a religious man and he didn't want a fuss made over him, but it

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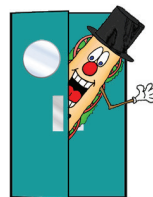
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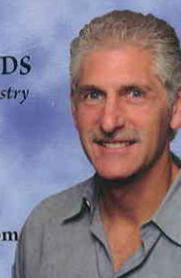
