Rabbi's Message

Rabbi Lisa Hochberg-Miller



Many fear every birthday with inevitable thoughts of age and aging. I never thought I'd say this, way-back-when, but I am finding age to be a positive!

y one sibling, my brother Sam, turned 63 at the end of June. After texting him a happy birthday message, he texted back: I have a "birthday thing I seem to do lately, where I try to gauge and share my accrued knowledge. At my company, someone in HR always posts birthday messages and others chime in. Here is my reply to many well wishes: 'Many fear every birthday with inevitable thoughts of age and aging. I never thought I'd say this, way-back-when, but I am finding age to be a positive! As an educator, I find that now I strive not just to teach facts but Wisdom. To make people better. A challenge to all this year: Let's make all those around us better. What greater gift, what more noble legacy is there?"

Wait! Noble legacy, imparting wisdom, and impacting those around us for good? How could this be my same brother Sam who, when he turned 30, lamented: "My generation always said, 'don't trust anyone over 30; now I can't even trust myself!" Age certainly has changed my brother in wonderful ways. And while I'd like to claim that

his wisdom is a family trait, the truth is- it's in the aging. Just as the Talmudic rabbis wrote that It is better to drink old wine than new, there is a depth and richness that can only come through time well-spent.

This August is a "big" birthday for me; and while it feels strange to say this new number aloud, I also know that, like Sam, I wouldn't want to roll back the decades if I had to sacrifice the wisdom acquired on the journey. In "Wise Aging: Living with Joy, Resilience & Spirit", the two Jewish authors write: "Erik Erikson speaks of a stage in our lives when we turn inward and gather up the life we have lived, make sense of its ups and downs, wrestle with existential questions, and strive to integrate all that we have learned and experienced. This effort to reach integration and equanimity is what Erikson considers wisdom. Rabbi Zalman Schacter-Shalomi named this saging: conscious life harvesting."

Living life mindfully, reflectively, humbly assessing our strengths and areas where we still wish to grow; these are steps all on the path to wise aging and saging. I find, over this last decade, I am

more conscious of the wise women around meso many are in this temple community. I learn about aging, growing, generosity, allocating time to others, responding to challenges of environment and health and family situations, from courageous and resilient women. So many of you inspire me. This past year, teaching Mindful Middot on Sunday mornings, as we explored refining those universal inner traits, such as our capacity for joy, or anger, or peace of mind, I was cognizant that our life experiences help us get unstuck from our habits. There is no doubt, that every day feels richer now, than in the decades that were so full with child-rearing and work that there was no time for reflection, inner work, and cultivating spiritual perspectives as part of daily life.

So first, on this birthday month for me, a thank you to my community, that has allowed me to grow in so many ways, and who is filled with so many women and men who mentor and inspire my own aging. And an invitation. Wise Aging is a book that can be used in Wise Aging circles, by groups of men and women together, who are willing to explore issues like our changing bodies, how to nourish our relationships, growing spiritually, living with loss and thinking about legacy and stewardship. It does not need a rabbi, or any trained leader, just people willing to meet and share, as they read the book. "A Wise Aging group is a small, trusted circle of peers in which you will be guided to do the reflective work that enables you to come to new understanding s about your life, your inner self, and your deepest values." If that sounds like a group you would like to create with some friends, let me know!

have been hearing concerns that our lobby isn't displaying our history. Rabbi Lisa has also been adamant that the lobby be a distinctly Jewish space that reflects our values. The Design Review Committee has been working on several designs, but it's a tall order to satisfy both contingencies. Some people want the commemorative tree hung back up, but to be honest, it looks rather shabby. During the Annual Meeting, I put out the trunk of the tree and a few of the acrylic panels. The trunk is made of plastic and the various names are on plastic pieces stuck on the acrylic with foam tape. We are working hard to come up with something better. Please be patient; we will have a design for your review soon. Remember, this will have to last 30 to 35 years. We want to get it right!

The House Committee is one of the hardest working groups at TBT. I hope you have noticed the spiffy paint job on our monument sign on Kimball as well as the new sign for Temple Beth Torah/Children's World off Foothill. The old fluorescent lights in the classrooms have been replaced with LED fixtures, which should save money over time. The Youth Building has undergone termite treat-

ment, dry rot repairs, and exterior painting. We are getting ready for the new school year.

We had an interesting discussion on safety during our last Board meeting. I had suggested that we start keeping the doors into the Sanctuary closed during services. To that end, the House Committee made adjustments to the hinges so the doors close quietly. The Ritual Committee and members of our Safety Sub-Committee discussed this proposal and rejected the idea. They were concerned that they wouldn't be able to respond quickly enough if the doors were closed and sounds were muffled. Closing the Sanctuary doors actually made people feel less secure. The discussion was thoughtful and all aspects were carefully considered. My idea was turned down, but I very much respect the input and thought that went into the rejection. I wanted to share this one example of a Board that works hard to always serve the best interests of this community. We are a fortunate congregation.





Our family picnics in August bring families together on their journey in the ECE preschool world. They get a chance to meet other families, their child's classmates and have a fun lunch.

The commitment, warmth and kindness that are shown by the 18 teachers we have here are felt and shown through the acts of commitment to the young children. They indeed are the best team we could ask for at TBT. They work overtime to create dynamic classrooms, curriculum and build strong relationships among the families and staff.

As Rosh Hashanah glides in this year, the High Holy Days will be celebrated by reinforcing what the children know and what the children remember of Rosh Hashanah. It is all about family, sound of the Shofars, Round Challah, Food, Bubbe's House, Apples and Honey, Honey cake and more food and fun activities.

This beautiful holiday allows the children to bake Challah and touch the sticky honey as it drips from their mouths. They celebrate by making Shofars out of paper, tooting the plastic ones, and having the Rabbi or Marisa visit their classroom. We talk about how each year Rosh Hashanah arrives, just like our birthdays. We also discuss Yom Kippur and the act of forgiveness and how we wish to improve in the coming months by being a "Mensch" to our fellow community and family. up to help make it a better world.....TIKUN

Some of the ways you can celebrate with your children or grandchildren:

Teach them to say "Shanah Tovah" as a greeting to someone; pass the shofar around with others just like you play musical chairs; bake a challah or honey bread; take a walk and collect colorful leaves; visit an apple farm, go to the super market and purchase different kinds of apples for baking; or share your favorite Rosh Hashanah recipe with another family or their school . Go and visit a person who cannot get out of their home and bring them cookies or baked goods.


